EAP Engagement

It is important to note that Moodle EAP lessons, PDM, and EAP tutorials are all counted for EAP engagement purposes.

The requirements for each of these elements are below:

EAP Moodle Lessons

In order to receive credit for Moodle engagement for the week, students must

- 1. complete all Moodle lessons for that week and
- 2. have an average score above 65%.

Students must complete Moodle lessons before 9 am on the day of the corresponding Zoom class.

However, students are not penalised if they have completed all tasks before Friday at 5 pm.

If a student continuously completes Moodle lessons after the corresponding Zoom class, this will be discussed in tutorials, and the student will receive a warning, which will go into their student report. A 'Cause for Concern' will be submitted, if the student does not conform to the requirements.

EAP Lesson Submissions

Students should also complete all other tasks, such as such as the Moodle Lesson Task, or activities that need to be uploaded to classroom lesson folders, or completed on shared google docs, before the zoom lesson, but the engagement grade is only calculated using the Moodle score.

If students continually fail to complete these tasks regularly, again, this will be discussed in tutorials, this will be recorded in their final report and a 'Cause for Concern' will be submitted, if the student does not conform to the requirements.

PDM Lessons

Students are awarded 1 point for a completed online lesson and 0 points if they have not done the lesson.

Attempted but incomplete lessons:

Students will receive a warning by email the first time this happens.

After receiving a warning, students will receive a '0' for engagement for subsequent incomplete lessons.

Missing answers count as an incomplete lesson. This will also lead to a 'Cause for Concern' record.

EAP Tutorials

Students are awarded 1 mark if they attend their tutorial.

If a student does not attend their tutorial, they are awarded '0'.

If you have a genuine and credible reason for being absent from university at any time, please speak with your tutor in advance.

If your absence involves any form of medical attention, you must obtain a doctor's note (spravka) and submit it electronically to students@nu.edu.kz and oh-students@nu.edu.kz

Please read the instruction document 'HOW TO GET SICK LEAVE CERTIFICATE (SPRAVKA) AND PROCESS OF VERIFICATION' (sent to all NU students on the 8th September 2020) and attached to this email.

Credible reasons for non-engagement may also be linked to internet issues. If you have an issue with internet you must inform your personal tutor immediately. If you do not, you will not be awarded your engagement grade.

Obtaining Primary Healthcare Services

The NU Health and Safety Department would like to inform you about the process of obtaining Primary Healthcare (PHC which stands for ΠΜCΠ) services at University Health Center and other PHC centers based on the required registration process:

- 1. **Those students who reside on campus** may receive health services at UHC based on the appointment.
- 2. **Students who live off-campus in Nur-Sultan** will be served <u>at RDC</u> based on the appointment.

3. Students assigned at UHC and located in other regions of Kazakhstan may be registered at primary healthcare clinics based on the temporary residing addresses via egov.kz portal.
